

He has served as dean or director at The George Washington University, the University of Michigan, Duke University, Case Western Reserve University, Gettysburg College, St. Lawrence University, and the University of Pittsburgh. Since retiring, Tim continues to teach a course or two at The George Washington University. Of particular relevance to the Shepherd Center, Tim served on the Board of Directors, chaired the Board, and later served as executive director of the nonprofit Center for Academic Integrity and associate director at the Kenan Institute for Ethics at Duke University.

Tim was a frequent guest on local NPR programs around the country and was quoted in a number of national media, including the New York Times, Wall Street Journal, and Time magazine.
